BOSTON BAROQUE CELEBRATES FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Boston Baroque, America's first permanent baroque orchestra, will celebrate its fortieth anniversary in their upcoming season, beginning on 8 November. An all-Beethoven programme at Jordan Hall at Boston's New England Conservatory includes the rarely performed Elegischer Gesang (Elegiac Song) and Symphony No. 9. The latter is the only Beethoven symphony the orchestra has never performed.

The season continues with Boston
Baroque's annual performance of Handel's
Messiah on 13 and 14 December; all-Bach
programmes on New Year's Eve and
New Year's Day including Brandenburg
Concertos 3 and 4; and a French baroque
programme taking place on 14 and
16 February 2014. This will feature
Charpentier's Te Deum and Rameau's
opera La Guirlande.

The season concludes with Monteverdi's Il ritorno d'Ulisse in patria on 25 and 26 April. Artists performing in the fortiethanniversary season include Portuguese tenor Fernando Guimarães, making his US performance debut with Boston Baroque, and Metropolitan Opera soloists soprano Leah Partridge, mezzo-soprano Kate



Lindsey and tenor William Burden.

As part of a drive to widen access to early music, the season includes a free community concert of Beethoven's Symphony No.9 in a deprived area of Boston. Further audience development plans include a 'social hour' before concerts as an incentive to audience members under the age of 40. Martin Pearlman, founder and music director of Boston Baroque, said: 'This season is not only a milestone for us, but it is also the fortieth anniversary of the wider field of period instrument orchestras on this side of the Atlantic.
