The plot is not particularly original but the characters are richly drawn, their strengths and weaknesses masterfully revealed. An immensely evocative work. lo Caird

Even readers with no knowledge of Bernard

Cooper's novels will find themselves sinking comfortably into his memoirs. Broadly chronological but moving frequently from recent experiences to childhood memories and back again, The Bill from My Father tells the story of a family's tragedies and absurdities without a trace of sentimentality. His inviting style makes us believe that we are seeing something of him that wasn't guite intended. The anecdotes he relates might have been mundane in isolation but collected together they make this book difficult to put down. JC
