THE lights go out in director Fernando Meirelles' allegorical drama BLINDNESS (18) - a film that's as thoughtful and inventive as it is gritty and depressing.

When a mysterious virus sweeps across a city, the entire population loses its sight. As society crumbles, the

infected are dumped in an abandoned mental hospital until infighting among the infected forces a band of inmates - lead by the only person to retain her sight (Julianne Moore) - to mount a daring escape in a bid to find home.

> While there are hints of a happy ending (of sorts) for the most part this is as dark and depressing as a film can be. From theft and adultery to violence and rape, Meirelles - who also helmed the edgy City of God - bravely plays around with uncomfortable situations which play out in astonishingly filthy locations.

At times the direction feels a bit on the scrappy side but Meirelles conjures up some great visuals that attempt to replicate the characters' loss of

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vision and the lead performances from Mark Ruffalo, as an infected doctor, and Moore, as his secretly-sighted wife, are well judged.

Covering such dark territory - literally and metaphorically - the film is perhaps more admirable than enjoyable but it asks some probing questions of society and is guaranteed to haunt you for days afterwards. - JUSTIN MATLOCK
